WHO WE ARE

Disaster Relief Australia is a veteran led disaster relief organisation. We use the unique skills and experience of military veterans and emergency services specialists; our members, to respond to natural disasters and community support operations in Australia and overseas.

WHAT WE DO

We bring hope to communities devastated by natural disasters and emergencies, and we improve veterans' wellbeing by giving them the opportunity to continue to serve and find purpose. In short, we help people on their worst days.

We will be the most trusted and innovative non-government disaster relief organisation in Australia.

We offer a unique opportunity to be part of a humanitarian effort with a unified purpose, mission and intensity similar to military service.

Disaster Relief Australia is an Australian company limited by guarantee and is registered with the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Commission. DRA is an Australian Non-Government Organisation (NGO). DRA is a Public Benevolent Institution (a charity), and is endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) by the Australian Taxation Office. We are committed to the accountability and transparency that is provided through our Corporate Governance Framework.

OUR MISSION

Our mission is to unite the skills and experience of military veterans with emergency services specialists to rapidly deploy disaster relief teams in Australia and around the world in the wake of natural disasters.


OUR PURPOSE

Provide a steady-state engagement model that provides continuous touch points with our Tribe between disaster relief missions.


Capture data to provide an evidence base that proves the positive effects of DRA's model.

GOAL TWO:

Disaster Resilient Communities

"... the leader in disaster mitigation and community preparedness"

WHAT SUCCESS LOOKS LIKE

10 fully equipped and operational Disaster Relief Teams positioned around Australia and harnessing veterans and emergency services personnel in those locations and surrounding areas.

Disaster Relief Teams are integrated into local, state and national disaster management plans and participate in forums, preparation activities and emergency management exercises.

Response times to mobilise and deploy throughout Australia and overseas are short, scaled to reduce lives lost and mitigate disaster impacts on survivors.

Technology and communications platforms are interoperable with federal, state and local emergency services.

Analysis of Disaster Relief Teams costs demonstrate disproportionate value for money in the delivery of disaster resilience, disaster mitigation and disaster relief capability.

WHAT WE WILL DO

- Recruit, train and equip 3 additional veteran led DRTs (total of 10), across Australia that will deliver expert disaster relief assistance in the wake natural disasters.
- Scale in a uniform and systematic way as funding is made available.
- Show, through action, how the latent leadership and service potential of our nation's veterans and emergency service specialists can be harnessed to build disaster resilience and relief capability.
- Identify and connect with change leaders in the NGO and disaster relief sectors to ensure we are constantly at the cutting edge of both technology and practice.



GOAL THREE:



Disaster Relief Operations

"... to become the pre-eminent disaster relief organisation both in Australia and throughout the Asia-Pacific Region"

WHAT SUCCESS LOOKS LIKE

Swift mobilisation to rapidly deploy Disaster Relief Teams in the wake of natural disasters in Australia and overseas.

Operating within existing international disaster relief frameworks across the Asia Pacific Region, supported by established relationships with government, industry and local communities.

The conduct of disaster risk mitigation and preparedness activities in Australia and overseas, particularly in under resourced and high-risk areas of operation.

Recognised leader in spontaneous volunteer management throughout Australia and a proven track record of connecting businesses to communities through corporate volunteering.

A world class provider of Remotely Piloted Aircraft capability, aerial damage assessment, mapping and Geographic Information Systems (GIS), in Australia and overseas.

The conduct of DRT led, concurrent disaster relief operations anywhere in Australia.

WHAT WE WILL DO

- Deploy highly trained personnel in the wake of natural disasters to deliver timely and effective disaster relief wherever and whenever it is needed.
- Continue to enhance and grow DRA's core suite of operational capabilities.
- Form collaborative partnerships that extend DRA's reach and knowledge within the disaster relief community.
- Provide DRA members a tailored development pathway that ensures they can achieve the highest possible level of operational proficiency.
- Develop new relationships in the Asia Pacific Region through key stakeholder engagement, disaster relief, community support and training activities.

Disaster Relief in Focus

SPONTANEOUS VOLUNTEERS (SPONVOLS) MANAGEMENT

Disaster Relief Australia is implementing a national Disaster Volunteer Engagement Plan (the Plan. The Plan addresses the volunteer '3rd echelon' in Australia's disaster management planning and advocates for the appointment of DRA as the lead agency responsible for the development, training and coordinated deployment of the nation's volunteers; structured, trained and equipped to provide:

- An immediate (localised) disaster response capability – 'Communities on the Front Line', pending the deployment of 1st Echelon – the emergency services.
- A determined, resilient and sustainable community throughout the disaster response and recovery phases.
- A proactive and sustainable disaster relief and community support capability following the recovery phase.
- A national asset consisting of trained volunteers, capable of conducting disaster relief, community support, resilience and preparedness activities.

AERIAL DAMAGE ASSESSMENT TEAM (ADAT)

Disaster Relief Australia will continue the development of the ADAT, utilising the DRA remotely piloted aircraft fleet and internally trained specialists to increase the effectiveness and safety of post-disaster operations. DRA will seek to become the lead agency for the provision of localised post-disaster aerial imagery and mapping data, utilising experience gained over the course of 649 post-disaster flights over the past two years across Australia and Asia-Pacific to provide:

- An immediate disaster response capability, available at short notice 365 days of the year, providing vital intelligence to complement existing manned aviation capabilities.
- Provision of actionable and timely data and intelligence to aid decision making by national and state level emergency management agencies and communities.
- Increased capability through the utilisation of new technology to enable world leading aerial data collection for disaster response and recovery operations in Australia.
- A national asset with highly trained veterans providing intelligence to Australian agencies both at home and abroad.





MEDICAL

Disaster Relief Australia will build on existing medical capability, further developing medical teams to improve the health and wellbeing of communities, emergency services personnel and veterans during disaster relief operations. Working to clinical practice guidelines and in partnership with organisations across Australia and Asia-Pacific, DRA will develop its medical program in order to provide:

- A medical service model that is integrated within the wider DRA operational service capability to attend to the health needs of the DRA workforce and to minimise the health impact of our deployments on the communities we serve.
- Trained wellbeing and welfare associates to assist our workforce and communities through the provision of peer support, initial crisis assistance, comfort and referral to established counselling services.
- Medical support to impacted communities through the deployment of mobile teams resourced for primary care assessments, advanced first aid, and specialist services as required, such as paediatrics, antenatal/obstetrics.
- Accredited, trained and resourced medics, including ex-military medics, paramedics, nurses and doctors on all disaster relief operations.
- Technology-based solutions, such as telemedicine, to bring expert assistance to disaster-affected communities.
- Internationally recognised medical capability through the attainment of the World Health Organisation Emergency Medical Team accreditation.

DISASTER RELIEF AUSTRALIA HAS THE FOLLOWING CAPABILITIES

A stable and diverse income stream with demonstrated financial stewardship.


A high level of public awareness and support for our organisation and our members.

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About our Values

Values guide our actions in the absence of policy or formal orders. Culture is the sum of our values and our actions. For that reason: DRA members must live our values every day.

ⁱ "Courage

"Act without fear or favour:" Leadership advice provided to platoon leaders in Vietnam War era pamphlet titled "Junior Leadership on the Battlefield".

" Mateship

"Mate first, self-second-always:" Is a comment from an unknown WWI Digger. He made the comment after witnessing a mortally wounded AIF soldier lying in a trench, refusing to be treated until the rescuers first dug out his mate, who had been buried by a bombardment.

iii Endurance

"Beyond the next hill is a river and beyond the river another hill:" Is a quote from WWII General Mark Clark (circa 1944), commenting on the life of the infantryman in WWII.

iv Service

The official WWI Australian Imperial Forces (AIF) Histographer, Charles Bean, distilled the definition of ANZAC to: Courage, Mateship, Endurance (the first three of our values) and Sacrifice. We have replaced sacrifice with service out of respect, but also because it better describes the value we are committed to.

* Tenacity

The hallmark of servant leadership is to inculcate an unrelenting bias for action in our leaders, captured here as determination, flexibility and grit = Tenacity.

vi Respect

Frederick William Baron von Steuben, 1778, Inspector General of the US Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War, noting an officer's first objective should be to treat his men "with every possible kindness and humanity. This formed the basis for including respect as a value in the US Army.
